Police seize 24 pounds of cocaine on I-55

A Texas man had his bond set at \$5 million after he was arrested allegedly trafficking \$500,000 worth of cocaine through Madison County, authorities say.

The man, Roberto Antonio


Escobar, 53, of El Paso, Texas, was arrested and charged with careless driving and trafficking in a controlled substance.

Madison Police Captain Kevin Newman said Escobar had an initial court appearance in Madison Municipal Court on Saturday, where his

bond was set at \$5,000,000.

"He is still at the Madison County Detention Center," Newman said.

COALITION Concerned Jackson residents uniting

After just a few months of meetings, a group of Jacksonians concerned about the city's future has made strides in reaching other concerned citizens, hosting regular meetings with public speakers.

"There is just more that is on the table now than there was even two or three months ago,' Val Vickery said. "We are excited. It is nice to see this is going somewhere."

Vickery is a founding member of Jacksonians 4 Jackson and is on the communications team. The Fondren resident said the group has grown from a loose group of concerned citizens on the Next Door app to a group that holds regular meetings in person.

She said exact membership is hard to nail down but said they distribute their newsletter to about 1,000 people and recently put a board of directors in place. She said they have developed a core group that is "in it for the long haul."

"Jackson has not gotten this way overnight and we are not going to fix it overnight," Vickery said.

Duan Carter has lived in Jackson for 30 years and currently resides in Northeast Jackson. He is the board member at Large for J4J. He said the goal of the group is to get more

people engaged.

"We are trying to stay engaged," Carter said. "We want to become an outlet for the people in Jackson to make their voice heard. We also want to get information out that is

Carter said the board is "still getting its sea legs" but said they are working on forming committees, getting incorporated and hammering out the group's "mission and focus."

Currently, the group sees its largest engagement in person during their regular meetings currently held at The Cedars on Old Canton Road in Jackson. Vickery said following a cancellation from Jackson Mayor Chokwe Antar Lumumba that her organization is looking to schedule a talk with Mississippi House of Representatives candidates for District 64 which includes Madison County.

Vickery said she hoped to schedule Incumbent independent Shanda Yates and her Republican challenger Amille Wilson for the Oct. 5 slot that was vacated by Lumumba or a future date.

Past speakers have included the third-party manager of Jackson's water system Ted Henifin and Rev. Neddie Win-

Tamper Specialty Coffee offering exotic beverages in Madison

Tamper Specialty Coffee owner Jonathan Littleton says coffee is more than just a beverage and that it is also something that brings people together.

'We want our shop to be somewhere for people to come hang out, study, and meet friends," Littleton said. "Coffee is very diverse and since we wanted to be a part of the community, we felt this shop was the way to do it."

For Littleton and his wife Tiffany, Tamper Specialty Coffee started as little more than a dream, and now that the shop is open and thriving, Littleton said the dream is even better now that it's a reality

After signing the lease for the building in October 2022, Littleton and his wife began work on their shop in February and completed it in July. They held a soft opening on Aug. 30 with a limited selection.

Madison Community Partners held a ribbon cutting for Tamper on Sep. 21, which served as the shop's grand opening. Mayor Mary Hawkins-Butler and other city officials were present.

"This is our first location," Little-

ton said. "We recently moved here around 18 months ago from Dubai after living there for a number of years. There, we fell in love with specialty coffees and specifically single origin coffees.

The term "single origin" is a coffee category that focuses on one distinct area or region where the coffee is grown. Coffee labeled as single origin can be traced to a single farm, farmer, producer crop, or region in

one county. The name "Tamper Speciality Coffee," according to Littleton, was inspired by two factors: one being that the word "tamper" is a way of applying pressure to expresso beans, and the second being that opening the coffee shop had he and his wife under a lot of pressure. 'The shop itself is made under

pressure, and to tamper something is to put things under pressure to make something beautiful," Littleton said.

Tamper's main staple is serving a number of these single-origin coffees and providing drinks made from three different types of expresso coffee beans from different countries, including Brazil, Ethiopia, and Honduras. They also offer a variety of

smoothies, shakes, and pastries. 'All of our beans are roasted lightly under a process called a shallow roasting, where they are roasted at a lower temperature for a longer period of time, so it's not as dark," Littleton said. "You can taste a lot more of the flavor profile that way. We have our

beans roasted in Norway, as we're partnered with a roaster there, to get that authentic European roast pro-

Along with the unique taste of Tamper's coffee, Littleton said he and his employees also use a state-ofthe-art expresso machine from the Netherlands and use an Italian milk frothing method for their drinks, and pay extra attention to it under specialty coffee guidelines.

Littleton said he felt Tamper still felt like more of a dream than a business, and although there was a lot of nervousness and anxiety starting something new, his business has been even better than he could've ever

"The community has been very receptive," he said. "We wanted this to be something to share with everyone in the community. Not just the product itself, but we also wanted to share the coffee culture of being able to meet friends with coffee and not have to spend a lot of money.

ters, the Mission Mississippi Director of Development. Vickery said Winters was a hit.

"He was outstanding," Vickery said. "He talked about racial healing. We have got to get to the point where we trust one another."

Restauranteur Jeff Good and businessman and former Jackson mayoral candidate Jonathan Lee are on the slate for November and J4J is already in talks with Henifin's office for a return visit early next year.

The group hopes to build a roster of over 5,000 voters in Jackson to influence change in the city.

"We are trying to build consensus," Vickery said. "We walk a fine line of non-party politics and non-denominationalism. We desire to build momentum so there becomes a tidal wave of like-minded people regarding integrity and the demand that our leaders represent those values.

Both Vickery and Carter stress that the group is "nonpartisan" and aims to engage all parts of Jackson.

Carter said "non-partisan" issues in his mind include safe communities, clean water, reliable trash pickup, good schools and good roads.

The group will be meeting on Thursdays at The Cedars off of Old Canton Road across the street from the St. Andrews Lower School campus moving forward. Vickery said the group hoped to find other locations to meet with the goal being to rotate through each of Jackson's seven wards.

The problem is finding a place to meet in each ward,"

Biden's electric car swindle

is not going to happen.

That admission came last week from the Biden administration official in charge of handing out subsidies to the alternative energy industrial complex that benefits from the White House's EV mandate.

Jigar Shah, chief of the Energy Department's Loan Programs Office, was responding to someone on X who naively believed the EV push is actually about changing the automotive fleet from one powered by gasoline to one powered by electricity. The true goal is reshaping socie-

"Replacing all of the vehicles in the world with EVs is not sustainable," Mr. Shah explained.

He continued: "We need to invest in micro mobility, new ownership models, better urban planning models and other improvements. We need to improve on the current 4-6% utilization rate of our current car fleet."

Breaking down the statements, the goal of forcing the sale of expensive electric cars is the elimination of the personal mobility made possible by gasoline-powered automobiles in favor of schemes more favorable to central planning. "Micro mobility" refers to the widespread use of scooters in an urban environment.

This makes no sense as a form of transportation if headed to the supermarket to support a family, if the weather is bad, or if you're an older adult or disabled.

"Utilization rate" refers to how much time a car is being driven, as opposed to sitting parked and unused. The only way for cars to be used around the clock is if they are owned in common, perhaps by a large corporation that allocates when and where they can be driven.

It's a clever way of saying people

A complete transition to electric vehicles shouldn't own their own cars anymore, and the overall number of cars of any kind would be reduced through "new ownership models." Only the rich and well-connected would be able to own their own automo-

> The left has always been hostile to personal mobility, in large measure because it enables people to roam freely about the countryside and live pretty much wherever they choose. It is no accident that Mr. Shah specifically notes that he wants "better urban planning models."

> By that, he means a central committee needs to control where you live, the size of your house and more.

In another tweet, he clarified: "Utilities also admit that the only way for them to accommodate EV load is to deploy managed charging — something they have piloted for decades." In other words, Big Brother will also be setting your thermo-

Mr. Shah knows there are not enough mines on the planet to produce the trillions of pounds of minerals that would be necessary to have enough electric vehicles for everyone who wants a car, particularly considering hundreds of millions of people on this planet are going to join the middle class in the next decade or so. They are going to want automobiles as well.

The good news is that some people are fighting back. Our friends at the American Energy Alliance are constructing the Save Our Cars Coalition, which is guided by a clear understanding of what the administration is up to.

Personal ownership of the automobile liberated millions of Americans to live, work and travel where and when they pleased.

That's a freedom worth defending.

Electric Cars a no-go in Britain

British Prime Minister Rishi Sunak, after first announcing a mandate requiring all fossil fueled vehicles sold in the UK after 2030 to be electric, succumbed to pressure from the Conservative Party and within his own government and announced Wednesday a delay until 2035. His goal remains net zero by 2050.

Sunak's goal continues to be based on his view that "climate change" is real and can be affected by what humans do. This remains debatable, but you wouldn't know if from watching or reading British media which, like U.S. media, regularly refuse to present arguments from scientists who disagree.

Charging stations remain a problem, along with battery life. One cabbie said he is afraid to turn on the air conditioner during summer for fear he will run out of electricity before his workday is done. Another told me he has a good deal at a car park that includes a charging station which he uses for an overnight top-off. Few others have such an option. What about lengthy road trips or emergencies when the car battery is depleted?

Speed limits have been reduced to 20 miles per hour in Central London, which creates rush hour-type traffic jams at all hours of the day. Bike lanes and motor scooters further complicate traffic, as do traffic lights that turn red it seems after only two or three blocks. The same speed limit is being proposed for less populated Wales. Supposedly reduced speed cuts pollution from petrol cars and limits accidents.

What happens when British and Americans – and who knows how many other nations – force their people to buy electric cars and world temperatures do not even modestly decline?

mostly opposed to the rapid transition from petrol to electricity. A poll taken last May of readers of the Daily Express newspaper found a whopping 88 percent would not switch to an electric vehicle. More recently that attitude seems to be changing and why wouldn't it, given the daily media drumbeat that the climate is getting worse and it is the fault of humans.

According to the Society of Motor Manufacturers and Traders (SMMT), "one in every 32 cars now comes with a plug, with 1.1 million electric cars now in use" on UK roads. While small compared to the total number of petrol vehicles on the road, the figure is up by more than 50 percent over the past year.

There are other problems, including paying China for the Lithium needed for car batteries. Rep. Chris Smith (R-NJ) claims forced labor is being used to mine cobalt, exploiting children in impoverished Congo, the world's largest producer of the mineral that is also needed for batteries. Should we be morally comfortable with this?

A London Times editorial gets it right: "Britain's infrastructure is far from ready for

this abrupt transition." At least former prime Minister Boris Johnson set 2035 as a transition goal.

Then there's the cost. Among the cheapest prices I found in an online search was for a tiny two-door car costing 36,000 pounds nearly (\$44,500). If you need a bigger car for a larger family, the price quickly escalates.

What happens when British and Americans - and who knows how many other nations - force their people to buy electric cars and world temperatures do not even modestly decline? Estimates of what it will cost are all over the place (like end of the world predictions coming from various sources who have been wrong with each of their forecasts). Bloomberg calculates lowering global temperatures will cost \$200 trillion. Morgan Stanley says the cost will be \$50 trillion.

This is all about politics, more government control of our lives, and the loss of individual freedom. What happens when Britain and America have gone all electric and the results are not as predicted? Who will take responsibility? Certainly not those now promoting this fiction. If you're in government and pushing something that doesn't pan out you never have to admit error.

lars' worth of the world's most advanced military equipment? No problem. (Also, gun control is for "fair share" losers like the American taxpayer.)

Tens of billions more in "economic stimulus"? No problem. Just line up over there, behind the bearded men from Iran with evil eyes wearing robes, sandals and turbans.

Government shutdown? Not a problem! Here in Washington, if your Hunter Biden insurance policy is fully paid up, both Democrats and Republicans will come together to ensure you never miss a payment, no matter how dysfunctionally broken the federal government may be.

With Hunter Biden in your pocket, we will open national parks in your country — even as we close them in ours! As the credit card commercial says, "What's in your wallet?"

Oh, and the best part of the Hunter Biden Platinum Gold Bribery Plan is that you also

get an entire deck of "get out of jail free" cards for the whole family, including corrupt grandchildren with shell company bank accounts.

They are suffering as much — or more — under the Biden economy than the rest of Americans. And they didn't have to pay Hunter Biden a dime to learn that painful lesson.

Words with no basis in truth

There are words given substance by deeds, and there are words with no basis in truth. Attorney General Merrick Garland has proved to be a master of the latter. The Justice Department, he assures us, practices the singular standard of law that his oath of office demands. Sadly, his lofty words fail to match his deeds.

Mr. Garland appeared before the House Judiciary Committee on Wednesday to answer for his tenure as the nation's top lawyer.

"The Justice Department works for the American people," he said. "Our job is to follow the facts and the law, wherever they lead. And that is what we do."

To the contrary, there is a glaring disparity between his handling of alleged wrongdoing on the part of former President Donald Trump and Mr. Garland's boss, President Biden.

Among the blizzard of charges leveled against Mr. Trump is his purported unlawful retention of classified defense information at his Mar-a-Lago home in Florida. Special counsel Jack Smith, whom Mr. Garland handpicked last November for the job, promptly indicted Mr. Trump on 40 criminal counts. The trial is scheduled for March 2024 — just as the Republican front-runner competes in primary elections with the goal of challenging Mr. Biden for the presidency.

Mr. Biden has his own document troubles, with classified material turning up at a Biden-sponsored think tank in Washington and at his residence in Wilmington, Delaware. Unlike Mr. Trump, who had authority as president to declassify protected records, Mr. Biden reportedly copped his documents while serving as a U.S. senator and vice president.

Mr. Garland named special counsel Robert Hur in January — less than two

months after the Smith appointment — to investigate the Biden case that mirrors Mr. Trump's. The result? Not even a drip to the leak-loving media. Unlike his predecessor's, Mr. Biden's reelection bid is jeopardized only by matters of age-related mental acuity rather than illegality.

Mr. Garland flashed senior moments of his own when facing questions from lawmakers regarding the issue that has made Mr. Biden the target of a House impeachment inquiry: alleged involvement in son Hunter's shady international business dealings.

When Rep. Mike Johnson, Louisiana Republican, asked whether the attorney general "had personal contact" with anyone at the FBI regarding the agency's Hunter investigation, the white-haired lawman stammered: "I don't ... I don't recollect the answer to that question," Mr. Garland said. "But the FBI works for the Justice Department."

"You don't recollect whether you talked to anyone at FBI headquarters about an investigation into the president's son?" Mr. Johnson asked. An equally incredulous American public could reasonably conclude that Mr. Garland is less qualified for his job than they thought.

The Department of Justice has lost America's trust. An Associated Press/NORC Center for Public Affairs Research survey conducted in August found that only 17% of U.S. adults have "a great deal" of confidence in the people running the department.

Mr. Garland claims in noble words that he has no interest beyond equal justice for all. Americans see sordid deeds, though, in the double standard he applies to Mr. Trump and Mr. Biden.

BIBLICAL PERSPECTIVES/J. Ligon Duncan III

The disciples will flee

If you have your Bibles, I'd invite you to turn with me to Matthew 26 verses 30 – 35. We will examine this passage under two headings. In verses 30 – 32, Jesus gives a word of warning and encouragement. Secondly, in verses 33 – 35 Peter responds with words of obstinance and pride. Let's look at these two sections together.

I. Jesus' Words of Warning and Encouragement

Jesus in verses 30 - 32comes to the disciples and says, "In fulfillment of God's certain word, the Father is going to strike Me down, and He is going to scatter you." Jesus, in verse 31, tells the disciples that all of them are going to fail Him that night. All of them are going to fall away. All of them are going to desert him. He says to them, "All of you are going to be untrue to your Master tonight, the one whose name you have professed; the one whom you have befriended, the one who has befriended you; the one with whom you have been serving and ministering in the kingdom of God in these last three years." That's what Jesus was facing that night, and He knew it, because it was His Father's will.

By sharing this prediction with the disciples, he teaches them something about themselves. He teaches them that they are all too self-confident, that they are all too self-trusting, that they've made idols of their own commitment and of their own faithfulness to Christ. They need to understand that apart from Him they are nothing, and that they need to depend completely upon Him because the things that they are going to face in the next hours are literally going to unman them, and they are going to flee. Jesus is issuing a warning here. It's a warning designed to help His struggling disciples in a time of need. If they would only listen. Jesus knows them better than they know themselves, and He knows their faith is weak. And so He warns them about their impending failure.

We as Jesus' disciples are weak, and we are susceptible to sin; and we ought never to reject His rebuke. We ought never to reject the warnings of the scriptures. Jesus' words should have awed His disciples. It should have led them on the one hand to say, "You have got to be

kidding. God the Father loves us so much that in order to forgive our sins, He's going to give You on the tree. You're out of your mind. This is beyond our grasp. This is the most glorious thing ever." They should have been awed by that declaration, but they missed it. And they should have been awed by that fact that Jesus was willing to lay His life down for them, but they missed it. And they should have been humbled by the fact that they themselves were going to desert

But Jesus doesn't only have a word of warning here, He has a word of encouragement. Notice verse 32. "After I have been raised, I will go ahead of you to Galilee." He is reminding them of the resurrection, and He's speaking of that resurrection with certainty. That should have given them great comfort. Though they will certainly be scattered, they were to be regathered by the Lord Jesus Christ. He's also giving them their marching orders. This is what they are supposed to do. Postcrucifixion. Post-burial. Post-resurrection. They are to go to Galilee. They are to start again, just where they started before. And it should have been a comfort to them as it is to us. God's words are to be anchors in a storm, something to hold on to when we can't see our

II. Peter's Words of Obstinance and Pride

Now verses 33 - 35 are a living illustration of how not to respond to the word of God. I want you to see three things that Peter did wrong. First of all, he disbelieved. The Lord Jesus Christ did not only say, "You are going to flee," but He had quoted Scripture from Zechariah 13, and Peter still says, "No, I'm not. You're wrong." He disbelieved the word of God. Secondly, he disdained his brethren. He said, "Look. Lord, these guys may desert You but I'm never deserting You. These men may not be men of substantial character. They may not have obtained the spiritual maturity that I have. They may desert You, but never me.3 He disdained his brethren and preferred himself over them. Thirdly, he was overconfident in himself. "Oh no, Lord, I will never desert You. I know myself. I'm not one to go back on my promises. I'm committed. I'm committed to this thing to the end." He disbelieved

the word of God. He disdained his brethren, and he was overconfident. When we are in that position, we are set up for a fall.

Then in verse 34, Jesus kindly, but firmly, reiterates His prediction. He said. "Peter, listen to me. It is an absolute certainty that before the rooster crows, you're going to deny Me three times." And so with real specificity, He makes it very clear that God's word is not off here, and that Peter should have received the rebuke. So Jesus had to explain to these men, before they were in the thick of it, that they were up against something that was far greater than their own natural abilities. Unless they were trusting in Him alone, and unless they were distrusting their own strength and their own tendencies and their own inclinations, then they were not going to be a match for the day to come. And friends that is a message that we need to learn as well. We must be sure today that our confidence is in the Lord Jesus Christ alone.

Yet, from response in verse 35, we see that he confided in his own strength, believing that he was more powerful than sin. Though Peter promises that he'll never, ever desert the Lord Jesus Christ, we know that he does. He will deny Him, finally denying Him with cursing before the rooster crows. And you might wonder, "How is this any different than what Judas does?" Well, Jesus tells us the difference between Judas and Peter. In Luke 22 verses 31 – 32, Jesus says, "Peter, Satan has demanded permission to sift you like wheat, but I have prayed for you." He had prayed for him specifically that he would enjoy the presence and the fellowship with God forever. Jesus, the Pastor, through His intercession on the cross and His intercession in prayer is the difference between Peter and Judas.

Ultimately, you see, the ground of the disciples' confidence was not in themselves or even in their faith, but in the object of their faith and in what He had done for them. And that is what makes a difference. That is what will make the difference for all of us.



Getting the Message/Rev. Chris Shelton

The faithful may stumble

In Daniel chapter 11, an angel gives Daniel a detailed prophecy of the kingdoms that will affect the people of Israel for the next several centuries. The time of this prophecy is around 500 BC. I will summarize the structure of the passage and then look at some application.

Verses 2 and 3 speak of the next most significant rulers to come. Xerxes is the strong Persian king in verse 2. He was the king in the book of Esther (475 BC). His aggression toward Greece led to the downfall of the Persian Empire and the ascendency of Greece. Verse 3 refers to Alexander the Great, who died around 323 BC.

When Alexander died, his kingdom was split into 4 kingdoms. In verses 5-20 the angel speaking to Daniel focuses on the struggle between the southern and northern kingdoms, meaning the Ptolemaic dynasty in Egypt and the Seleucid dynasty in Syria. The prophecy centers on them because Israel is caught in the middle of their wars to conquer and control each other and the land of Palestine, the glorious land mentioned in verse 16. These verses cover the time of 322-175 BC.

Verses 21-35 depict the reign of Antiochus Epiphanes. Ĥe was also written of in Daniel chapter 8, a type of anti-Christ. He oppressed the people of Israel and desecrated the temple worship.

This is an unusual prophecy because of such specific detail. Because of that, many critics don't believe it was written by Daniel, but rather by someone after the events as a history. But the book says God sent an angel to Daniel with this information. It is hard for some to believe God is God. There is nothing He doesn't know or nothing He cannot do. He chose to give this information to us before it happened. The question we should ask is why?

The futility of the kingdoms of men is a pervasive theme in verses 5-20. Power ebbs back and forth between the two kingdoms at great cost of lives and wealth. The depravity within them culminates in a personification of evil in king Antiochus Epiphanes. This is a history of wicked

We are taught that the prospects of the wicked are dismal. Their brightest hopes

will fail them. Their hopes rest on errors: that God does not care what they do and that they are not answerable to the Lord God. Nevertheless, God says in Isaiah 40 that He sits above the circle of the earth and brings princes to nothing.

this time, subject to the whims of these warring kingdoms. Her trajectory is downward in both power and faithfulness, though there is a faithful remnant. The days of power like David and Solomon will not return to Israel. When Christ comes, He invites men into the kingdom of God which is an eternal and righteous kingdom. This call to enter God's kingdom is in light of the futility and demise of the kingdoms of men. The Lord Jesus will come as King who serves His people, a stark contrast to earthly kings.

Verses 29-34 are about the evil Antiochus inflicts on the people of God. Some were led away from the holy covenant by his deception, while others resisted and suffered for their faithfulness. The faithful are assured of being vindicated by God in the end (verse 35).

The Bible often repeats that the people of God are to be heavenly minded. Heaven is where the citizenship of the Christian is. Our hearts are to be where Christ is, trusting in Him as we serve Him in this world. The promise of His salvation is both com-

This is yet another passage in Daniel afflicted and yet greatly loved by God, as the angel told Daniel (chapters 9, 10). The conscience may be at ease before God in suffering, but not in denying or compromising the Lord.






